Chancellor's budget update

I am including here a message which Chancellor Galatolo sent out yesterday morning concerning the state budget crisis and its implications for our district and colleges. The district will continue to send update emails over the summer, and our College Budget Committee has scheduled monthly meetings. The District Committee on Budget and Finance will also be staying in touch over the summer.

As we conclude another academic year, I would like to take this opportunity to recognize each and every one of you for your hard work and sustained commitment to our students and to the District as a whole. I want to personally thank you for the contributions you make in shaping your College's future through your active participation in a wide variety of significant activities throughout the year. Similarly, the quality and effectiveness of our teaching and learning is revealed through the outstanding work that's been accomplished in refining our academic programs and services as well as through positive reinforcement from the accreditation commission. All of these worthwhile activities will have a positive, long-term impact on our current and future students. Again, I thank you for your continued and unwavering commitment to academic excellence and for shaping our academic programs and services in the spirit of true collaboration and teamwork.

Unfortunately, as we head into the summer we have been bombarded with very discouraging information regarding the economic instability of our state and the obvious detrimental impact that crisis will have on public education as a whole. Early indications suggest that the statewide budget deficit – ranging from \$21 to \$25 billion – would translate into local budget reductions in the neighborhood of \$18 to \$20 million for our District. This is in addition to the nearly \$8 million in budget cuts we took as a 2008/09 mid-year reduction. Now, more than ever before, in short order we will need to collectively face this new challenge head-on to ensure that we are well positioned to effectively address this unprecedented economic crisis. Accordingly, over the summer, the District and College leadership will be carefully examining the fiscal ramifications of the state's budget deficit and its relative impact on our three Colleges and the District Office. This work will be performed over the summer so that all stakeholders will be prepared to jointly tackle this issue in the fall. Again, my promise to you is that I will actively engage all the constituent groups to chart a course that will balance our institutional mission of broad teaching and learning against the limited available resources required to deliver our essential academic programs and services to the community we serve.

Of course, our ongoing efforts to build, renovate and renew our existing facilities will continue over the summer. As each month passes it becomes more evident that the campuses are methodically being transformed and I'm sure you'll notice even more changes when you return in

the fall. As always, I thank you again for your involvement in the planning of these vital improvements and for your patience during the construction process.

Finally, once again, I extend my sincerest gratitude to all of you for everything you do to make our District a first-rate institution. I look forward to seeing you at Opening Day on August 17th at Skyline College. At that event, I will unveil everything that I know with regard to this financial crisis and its impact on our institution. Please mark your calendars now and additional information will follow during the summer describing in greater detail the Opening Day program.

College Council Update

The College Council held its last meeting of the year on Wednesday, May 27. Minutes of prior meetings are archived at <http://www.skylinecollege.edu/facstaff/GovCommittees/>.

- 1. Selection of Skyline Shines Award winner for 2009:** the selection was made from among excellent nominees. The winner will be announced at the Opening Day event at Skyline on Tuesday, August 18.
- 2. Budget update:** Vicki Morrow provided an update on the implications of the governor's budget proposal for 2008-09 and 2009-10 for the colleges and the district. It includes severe cuts, including about 70% reductions over the two years to categorical programs. She and Ray Hernandez described the meeting of the District Academic Senate with the chancellor and the three college presidents concerning the process for communication about these budget challenges over the summer and afterward. (See the chancellor's message above for more about that.)
- 3. District Shared Governance council update:** Adolfo Leiva reported on discussions of these topics: a proposed bill to allow the district to offer the BA degree since this county has no public four year institution; proposed changes to the district Rules and Regulations and the process to be used for minor technical changes as distinct from substantive ones, and the status of the plus/minus grading proposal.
- 4. Proposed name changes for the Gallery Theater (to Gallery) and the Main Theater (to Theater):** these proposed changes were approved by the College Council, and will be recommended by Vicki Morrow to the Chancellor's Council.
- 5. Compressed Calendar Committee update:** Adolfo reported on the establishment of Workgroups to undertake the feasibility analysis for the compressed calendar. They will begin in the fall. The college's survey is complete and a similar survey will be conducted at CSM and Canada.
